### BOARD REPORT

**NOVEMBER 1, 2024** 

Committees of the Board of Directors meet via Zoom prior to the in-person meeting held on November 1. All members were present.

Our November meeting is always a special one because we have lunch with the staff. CSA is fortunate to have so many wonderful and dedicated staff members. They work very hard to meet our members' needs, whether it is in fraternal, sales, claims, or just answering questions. Thanks to you all for jobs well done.

November is also the month to elect new lodge officers. Congratulations to all the officers and good luck for the coming year.

Watch the Fraternal Calendar (page 9) as deadlines for the Photo Contest submissions and Bowl-O-Rama registrations have been moved to September. This will ease the crunch for the department since lodge reports, LRP submissions, scholarship applications, and vari-

ous fraternal deadlines fall at the beginning of the year.

Sister Deegan has also been exploring additional fraternal benefits for our members.

Molly May, who is in charge of the marketing and social media, indicated that Facebook, Instagram, and LinkedIn are the three internet apps that are most often used by our members. President Kielczewski reported that our portfolio remains very stable and continues to yield 4.2% when adjusted for Annuity Reinsurance. Sales continue to be stable, and we should reach our Life Premium goal. We will fall short of the Annuity goal mainly because the Federal Reserve has lowered rates. Banks are able to offer CDs at higher rates to their customers without the 5-7 years penalty for early withdrawal that we have to charge. Working with Parkway Advisors, our investment firm, we are looking for ways to increase the investment return.

The next Board meeting will be via Zoom on March 7, 2025. Please be sure to contact your Director with your concerns.

### Handy Hacks to Take the Stress Out of Holiday Hosting

#### Apple Cider Balsamic Glazed Pork Loin

Prep time: 10-15 minutes Cook time: 45-60 minutes

Servings: 6

1 Coleman Pork Loin (4 pounds) salt and pepper to taste 1 tablespoon olive oil

#### Glaze:

- 1 cup apple cider vinegar glaze
- 6 tablespoons whole grain mustard
- 4 teaspoons balsamic vinegar
- 1 teaspoon minced rosemary
- 1 teaspoon minced sage
- 1 teaspoon minced thyme
- 2 teaspoons minced garlic
- salt and pepper, to taste 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 4-6 sliced apples

Preheat oven to 350 degrees and line a sheet pan with parchment paper. Set aside.

Remove pork from packaging and pat dry with paper towel. Season all sides with salt and pepper, to taste.

To make glaze: In bowl, whisk apple cider vinegar glaze, mustard, balsamic vinegar, rosemary, sage, thyme, and garlic. Add salt and pepper, to taste. In steady stream, slowly add olive oil to emulsify while whisking.

In large skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. Sear pork loin 2-3 minutes on each side.

Move pork to lined baking sheet and brush on about half the glaze. Roast 30 minutes.

Remove pork from oven and spread sliced apples around pork loin. Brush remaining glaze over pork and apples. Bake 20-30 minutes, or until internal temperature reaches 150 degrees.

Let pork loin rest at least 10 minutes before slicing.

### **Stuffing-Filled Pork Chops**

Prep time: 10-15 minutes, Cook time: 30-45 minutes Servings: 6

#### Stuffing:

- 1 small box biscuit mix
- 1 stick butter
- 2-3 stalks finely diced celery
- 1 finely diced onion
- 1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
- 1-2 cups chicken broth
- 1 bag cornbread stuffing mix
- 2 eggs, beaten

salt and pepper, to taste



- 6 Coleman Natural bone-in or boneless pork chops oil
- 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- 1 teaspoon minced sage
- 1 teaspoon minced thyme
- 1 teaspoon minced rosemary

To make stuffing: Bake biscuits according to package directions, one day ahead. Dry biscuits will absorb more broth.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

In skillet, melt butter, then add celery and onions. Saute until onions are translucent, then add poultry seasoning and half the broth. Set aside to cool.

In bowl, combine stuffing mix, crumbled biscuits, and eggs.

Add onion mix to bowl and mix well. Add leftover broth if mixture is too dry. Set aside.

Slit each chop on rounded side, cutting almost through to the bone, to create deep pockets for stuffing.

Season chops with garlic, sage, thyme, and rosemary. Fill each chop with stuffing mixture. Use toothpicks to keep chops closed.

Preheat skillet with oil over medium-high heat and sear each chop 2-3 minutes on each side.

Once chops are seared, add remaining stuffing to pan, cover with foil and bake 30-45 minutes until chops reach 140 degrees in center. Remove foil for last 10 minutes to brown top of stuffing, if desired.

1 cup banana cream Greek yogurt

3 eggs

1 cup crushed pineapple

1 cup crushed pecans

1 cup all-purpose flour

2 tablespoons melted butter

#### Frosting:

1 stick butter, softened

1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened

1/4 cup heavy whipping cream

5 cups powdered sugar

1 package pecans (optional)

Heat oven to 350 degrees.

In mixing bowl, combine spice mix and sugar. Blend in yogurt, eggs, and pineapple. In separate bowl, mix pecans, flour, and butter. Then add to cake mixture.

Grease two 8-inch cake pans with butter. Pour half the mixture into each pan, then bake 45 minutes. Cool on rack before icing.

To make frosting: In mixing bowl, mix butter, cream cheese, and heavy whipping cream. Slowly blend in powdered sugar. Ice cake and then decorate with pecans, if desired.

#### Coconut Cake

Recipe courtesy of "Cookin' Savvy"

1 vanilla or white cake mix

1 cup all-purpose flour

1 cup sugar

1 cup coconut Greek yogurt

1 cup milk

2 tablespoons melted butter

3 eggs

Frosting:

1 stick butter, softened

1 package (8 ounces) cream cheese, softened

1/4 cup heavy whipping cream

5 cups powered sugar

2-4 cups shredded coconut

Heat oven to 350 degrees.

In mixing bowl, mix cake mix, flour, and sugar. Blend in yogurt, milk, butter, and eggs.

Grease two 8-inch cake pans with butter. Pour half the mixture into each pan and bake 45 minutes. Cool on rack before icing.

To make frosting: In mixing bowl, mix

butter, cream cheese, and heavy whipping cream. Slowly blend in powdered sugar.

Ice cake, then pat shredded coconut gently into icing.

#### **Christmas Cinnamon Cookies**

Recipe courtesy of "Cookin' Savvy"

1 2/3 cups self-rising flour

2 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon ginger

1/8 teaspoon cloves

1/2 cup sugar

1/2 cup brown sugar

1 egg

2 tablespoons water (optional)

1 cup powered sugar (optional)

In mixing bowl, combine flour, cinnamon, ginger, cloves, sugar, brown sugar, and egg to make dough. If dough is too dry to form into ball, add water. Form into log and wrap in parchment paper. Refrigerate 1 hour.

Heat oven to 350 degrees.

Roll dough out and cut into shapes with cookie cutters. Place on cookie sheet covered in parchment paper and bake 8-10 minutes. Let cool on rack then dust with powdered sugar, if desired.



### Post-Party Cleaning Tips

- 1. Don't be afraid to ask for help, especially from your partner or children.
- 2. Prep your table the night before. Get sparkling dishes and glassware by using a product which assists in drying and helping your dishes shine when used in the rinse cycle.
- 3. Start by collecting trash and clutter. Throw trash away and create piles of

items that need returned to their proper places. Remember that taking a few extra minutes to organize things like seasonal decor as you go can help make next year's event easier.

4. Complete each job before moving to the next. - 1/2 cup cold, unsalted butter
- 2/3 cup buttermilk
- 1 tablespoon butter, melted

Turkey Pot Pie Filling:

- 1/2 cup turkey fat
- 1 1/2 cups diced onion
- 1 1/2 cups diced carrots
- 1 1/2 cups diced celery
- 1 bay leaf
- 1 tablespoon minced garlic

1 tablespoon chopped thyme

- 1 tablespoon diamond crystal coarse salt
- 1 tablespoon coarse black pepper
- 1 cup all-purpose flour, divided
- 8 cups cold turkey stock
- 1 tablespoon Tajín Clasico Seasoning, to

6 cups leftover cooked turkey, chopped

To make biscuits: In mixing bowl, combine flour, baking powder, sugar, salt, and cream of tartar.

Grate butter and mix with dry ingredients.

Carefully add buttermilk and mix until incorporated.

Fold over 5-6 times, roll out, and cut into 10-12 rounds.

Place cut biscuits on floured surface.

Refrigerate 30 minutes.

To make turkey pot pie filling: Preheat oven to 375 degrees.

Heat large pot over high heat and add

turkey fat.

Add onions, carrots, celery, bay leaf, garlic, thyme, salt, and pepper; gently sweat.

Add 1/2 cup flour and cook 2-3 minutes.

Add turkey stock, 2 cups at a time, allowing to thicken before adding more.

In bowl, mix remaining flour with turkey.

Add turkey to pot, bring to simmer until thickened.

Add seasoning, to taste.

Add pot pie filling to casserole dish and gently place biscuits closely together on top

Brush biscuits with melted butter and bake 25-30 minutes.

Remove from oven and cool 10-15 minutes before serving.

## An African Adventure of a Lifetime!

Africa and safaris were something I thought about for a long time since reading about the experiences in my travel magazines and seeing documentaries on TV, admiring big game animals and their natural surroundings, the unique, colorful culture of the people, and how different life would be there. So, when Dan and I were discussing where to travel next, he mentioned, "How about Africa?" I immediately said "Yes!" and thus started a rewarding journey filled with wonder and awe and something that far exceeded any of my preconceived thoughts!

We went with TAUCK travel to the Wildlife Odyssey Tour which visited Zimbabwe, Botswana, and South Africa, and lasted 12 days (but we added one more, September 17, Dan's birthday!) This tour had a wide variety of experiences that included not only exciting safaris but other activities to give us great immersion of the culture of these countries.

TAUCK travel sent our olive green, roomy duffel bags with rollers a month before our trip and we were allowed a carry-on. They were specific with the list of clothing colors (khaki, cream, olive, neutral), and hiking shoes, and layers for weather changes within the three countries. Temperatures ranged from the 40s to the 80s in Cape Town!

When we finally landed in Victoria Falls, we were greeted with male dancers and singers in front of the airport and they were very enthusiastic, joyful, energetic, and loved to sing in their loud harmonious voices. They clapped and stomped loudly the entire time to their beat. This was our first photo op!

Our first night before the official start of our tour, we stayed in a hotel in Victoria Falls and hopped on the shuttle to take us into town! Colorful little shops and a market nearby made it fun and interesting. Some men would come up to try to sell us their wares. They were always friendly, but very persistent! We were amazed when we saw a warthog roaming along the sidewalk and a baboon by a store, but it is normal, and no one thinks anything of it!

The next day we were off to our Elephant Camp, our first official day of the tour, set in Victoria Falls National Park overlooking the Zambezi gorges. What a picturesque setting with a wide vista, beautiful lodge, pool, fire pit area for all, and our own personal, separate, and spacious tent "homes," that even had our own deck, private pool, and outdoor shower! We met for the first time with our group (16 of us) and our guide, Chris Morrison. Everyone came from the United States on our tour, and we meshed right away!

Our first safari ride was in the afternoon going into sunset. We stopped for conversation, snacks, and drinks at the breathtaking Zambezi Gorge with the river down below. The stunning sunset made everything simply beautiful!

Meals at all our gorgeous lodges were outside, but under a roof. Many times, the chefs would come out to greet us, and a couple evenings we had more singers and dancers come to visit us!

Our walking tour of Victoria Falls was truly outstanding! This is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and one of the Seven Natural Wonders of the World, and also the largest waterfalls in the world. It was a sunny day, so the rainbows always added to the beauty! The loud rush of the water was so impressive, and the length of the falls just went on and on in great glory! Since it was the dry season, we didn't need to wear raincoats or cover our cameras, but we could see more of the depth of the falls and getting different perspectives and views of

these vast, magnificent falls was truly a highlight! You can wade in the water in a designated area at the edge of the falls! But with our binoculars, it looked like there was someone who watched so you wouldn't go overboard! I'm not sure I would be that brave but there were a handful of people out there!

The next stop for the day was so special and memorable as we went to the Elephant Sanctuary for a private visit with a family of elephants out in the bush! The handlers gently led the elephants to strategic spots so that we could pet them, and hug them. We had to watch our feet to keep from being stepped on! The male elephant was huge. They didn't mind that we were all gently petting and touching them, even their ears! Then we took a hike to another area as the elephants walked single file with us, and there were baskets of molasses treats for them, and we got to give them these treats! You say, "trunk up" or "trunk down" and you get close and toss the treats into their mouths or, when trunk is down, into the trunk the treats go! The female elephant we fed was named "Coco" and I took home a print to frame, on a paper fiber made of elephant excrement. I know, it sounds strange, but they eat so much fiber, it's possible! Coco's footprint is on the print with the Victoria Falls Wildlife Trust logo. I loved bringing some of Coco home with me!

We then visited The Victoria Falls Wildlife Trust Clinic, renowned for promoting environmental conservation in Southern Africa. We visited the medical care facility and orphanage dedicated to the health and welfare of Africa's wildlife. We also met the naturalists and doctors who work there, learning about their efforts to protect animals injured by traps, snares, and poachers, and meeting the wildlife they rescued, like one of the vultures. I'm glad we had this private tour to get the behind-the-scenes experience of the care and safety for these magnificent animals!

Our tour guide bought us colorful cloth drawstring bags, made by the African women, to put our shoes into, as the soles had to be washed with a chemical solution. The tour company did for us! We also each walked over an area with the solution to clean the soles of the shoes we were wearing and our bus had to go through a solution on the tires, all to thwart the possibility of bringing the highly contagious Foot and Mouth Disease into their country. There have been breakouts among cattle, sheep, pigs, and goats.



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Chobe Game Lodge in Chobe National Park is Botswana's first national park and attracts large herds of elephants and Cape Buffalo that frequent the Chobe River. Our late sunset cruise was so beautiful and serene. On one side of the river was Botswana, and the other side was Namibia! The stillness of our surroundings as we glided along the river, and the elephants (including babies) on the shore chomping on the large grasses and reeds, were so fun to watch. We also saw big herds of water buffalo.

The safari guides were excellent and immensely knowledgeable about the animals, their habits, and all safety needed for with dealing with any challenges. The animals pay no attention to the jeeps as they are used to them and know that they are not a threat! But, there is jeep etiquette: No standing or loud voices, and arms and limbs must stay within the jeep. It was very exciting when we were following an animal on the hunt, and the driver whisked us off-road (only on private reserves, not national parks) at great speed to follow them. We were able to follow lions, wild dogs, and hyaenas, and even knocked over trees on our expedition. The drivers are knowledgeable on which trees that they can't run over. I held on during the very bumpy ride, ducked with branches coming near my face (and they would warn us!), and was glad my seatbelt worked. I felt like I was in a National Geographic documentary!

We were both in the national parks and a private reserve, but the animals are always totally able to move about anywhere without restrictions, even roaming to other countries. When in a private reserve, the parameters of our jeeps were strictly enforced as large fines would be administered if they went over to the national park area.

The trackers memorize every road in the bush with letters and numbers assigned (but no actual signage), and when a pack of lions or a leopard is spotted or there is something unusual to see, they radio the other jeeps, and they all converge and come over in a hurry! It was truly a thrill to watch the animals in their natural habitat, how alert they are, and how they hunt. It was also fun to pass herds of impalas, kudus, and giraffes. Even though they are not afraid of you, they stop and observe you! Monkeys in the trees, frolicking and grooming each other, jumping from limb to limb, were entertaining, as were the baboons! We also saw exotic and colorful birds as we had some avid and knowledgeable birdwatchers on our trip! The hippos in the water were exciting as we waited for them to come up for air so we could see their big jaws, and we did see one laying in the sun by the water! We also saw crocodiles! Baby monkeys getting a ride on their mothers' backs were another treat to see!

The biggest thrill was to turn a corner in the bush and see these different animals for the first time! The first time we saw one lion was breathtaking, just by himself languishing in the morning sun, so quiet, majestic, and serene. Once, on another morning, there was a pack of six of them as we turned the corner! They glanced at

us but were enjoying the warmth of the morning sun and we got to see them frolic and roll around! The giraffes were a lot of fun, chomping the limbs on the treetops. They were so graceful when they walked, and they stood together, swaying, and wrapping their necks around each other.

Most impressive were the elephants and there were so many! And, so many sweet babies! They are so protective of their families, and the way they lumber along with their big ears flapping is really interesting and fun to observe! We watched them trek down together to get water in the river, and the little ones always stay by their mother's side or almost underneath her as she patiently waits for her baby to nurse. Since this is the dry season, the elephants also reach down and gather dirt and mud and fling it on their bodies to protect their skin from the sun, repel insects, and regulate their body temperature! So, some looked quite dirty!

We visited a women's co-op at a local village in Botswana, filled with beautiful and colorful handmade fabrics, wares, and baskets, and the ladies were singing and swaying and twirling in their full skirts. They loved our visit!

Our tour guide leads a not-for-profit organization, and we had an interesting experience loading two flat screen TVs onto our jeeps to be used by a school for learning purposes. These children were very sweet but neglected by their parents; such a shame. The school was colorful but very simple. The children were probably 5-10 years old, and they were so cute! All the children learn to speak English (very common in Africa), and we enjoyed their singing of the "ABC's," "Wheels on the Bus," etc., and the TVs we brought (and one little one they were watching when we got there!) were definitely the most technological items they had! Everything else was just in two large, but airy, rooms with a tall metal cabinet full of books, art and craft items, and wallboards with the alphabet, numbers, etc. The school director and teachers were very nice, and you could tell they took good care of the children.

Going into their grocery store was fun! So many American manufacturers were represented but there were also different kinds of products geared to their culture. There was lots of candy and, of course, M&M's! We saw a McDonald's in town, too!

The safari game drives were continuous morning and evening, and we would meet at 5:30 a.m. for prepared coffee, tea, and delicious little pastries and fruit, and off we went from 6:00 a.m. – 9:00 a.m. and then come back for a beautiful breakfast afterwards! The game drives in the afternoon were also about three hours and we needed to be out of the bush by about 6:30 p.m. The sunsets were gorgeous and getting photos of elephants, etc., with the sun setting behind them, was so striking. One evening, we extended our 6:30 p.m. curfew and it was dark. The spotlight the tracker uses when he sits in a seat in the front of the jeep (without a seatbelt...not sure why he wasn't flung off!) is very bright and on the way out he would be able to spot the bright eyes of animals in the reflection of his flashlight. He once spotted a chameleon! I asked if we could stop the jeep in the dark and turn off all the lights to see the majestic stars and moon and experience the quiet of the bush except for any animal sounds. It was so neat. It felt a little dangerous, but very special!

We all know that beyond the wonder and beauty of the bush lies the reality of danger and harshness for all the animals watching out for predators, while being on the prowl for food for their own survival. One day our jeep passed a site that was unforgettable, and luckily farther away. It was lions devouring an elephant, which they don't usually hunt, and our guide said was very unusual. The elephant didn't seem large or old, so it was surmised that it may have been ill. Nonetheless, it was rather shocking to see. Luckily, the stench was not too strong as we eventually moved on from an unforgettable sight.

Another fun story was when our jeep was on a path and we saw a herd of elephants that was crossing our road, so our driver just stopped, and we all sat very quietly as the elephants passed us on all sides. It was a little intimidating, but so exciting! Seeing them all coming right at us was a little unnerving, but they lumbered past us, ears flapping, babies with their mamas, stopping to scratch themselves against trees, and it was really a great experience to be right in the middle!

Since this was the dry season, some of the watering beds and small rivers were totally dry and sandy and there were a couple times when it was getting dark and our jeep got stuck in the sand! We were all looking at each other thinking, "OK, this is it! We're done for!" It really took a lot of maneuvering and sand and dust flying everywhere before we got going, and everyone clapped when we did!

We ended up seeing a leopard, lots and lots of elephants, rhinos (mother and baby), lions, giraffes, water buffaloes, zebras, hyaenas, warthogs, hippos, baboons, monkeys, eagles, a falcon, mongoose, kudus, impalas, badgers, crocodiles, and wild dogs (which are becoming quite rare), and many beautiful and exotic birds.

At our lodges it was always mandatory to call the front desk to be escorted to and from our rooms by a lodge guide to be protected from any wild animals roaming around since we were in the bush. They would have danger signs here and there on the grounds to warn us. We would see animals occasionally, so we heeded to this! Also, we had outdoor evening dinner events that were surrounded by a wall to protect us

from animals, and that was called a "Boma." The dinner would be elegant with china and linen but everything, the chefs cooking, desserts, music, singers and dancers, and even fire pits, were all enclosed by this wall, and it was a magical sight with the candles, fire, and lighting, knowing we were really in the bush with the animals, and moon and stars above! All of our safaris included a refreshment stop where a table would be set up with linens, fancy nuts, bakery items, water, coffee, and alcoholic drinks were even available! But even though we had these special perks, the safaris, guides, and animals were totally authentic, so we had appreciation for the best of both worlds!

My favorite story and biggest thrill were while we were in Chobe National Park in Botswana. We had been looking to find and see our first leopard, which happened to be hard to locate (usually up in the trees!) and it was our second day trying to find one. It was dusk and our driver got a call from a fellow jeep driver who had finally spotted a leopard, and we drove at break-neck speed to get to this spot (we were holding on for dear life and flying!) and we were the second jeep to get there! Close by our jeep stood this little metal shelter where the leopard supposedly was. In the meantime, many jeeps that were also alerted zoomed up behind us. We all waited with bated breath and then we saw the beautiful leopard slinking around the building, but not paying any attention to us! Everyone was very, very still and quiet, their cameras ready, (including me!). It was walking slowly toward our jeep, walked over by Dan's side, walked underneath our jeep, and then he stopped and actually sat right next to me on the ground! I could have patted him on the head he was so close, and I just held my breath and clutched my camera with my heart pounding even though I think I stopped breathing, and then, he looked up right at me! My photo! What are the chances of that? I was so thrilled. It is kind of scary when I think of it now...what if he pounced? The one leopard we saw on the whole trip, that took over a day to find, sitting next to me? I will never forget this!

Another unique event was at our Ngala Lodge in Botswana. We had an infinity swimming pool. Elephants would come down the hill (remember, our lodge was in the bush!) and come up to the pool where right below the run-off of the regular pool was another layer for just animals. So, we saw a big elephant lumber down from the hill for a drink right at our pool!



Another thrill was our safari walk (only eight of us decided to be brave!). We had no jeep, we just walked with a guide who had a rifle. It was a little intimidating and made me feel vulnerable, but it was exciting, too! Our guide showed us his signal with his hand in case of an emergency so we could be quiet and freeze. Luckily, we didn't see any animals close by and we learned about the bush and its fascinating fauna and flora, identifying tracks and scents of animals that have passed. Walking safaris are only permitted on private lands and not in Africa's national parks. We made it back to the lodge unscathed!

Next, off we flew to impressive and beautiful Cape Town! We stayed at the gorgeous and historical Belmond Mount Nelson Hotel, painted pink for peace in 1918, and nestled on a lush garden estate at the foot of Table Mountain. The scenery and shipping port, terrain, and energy of the city is really palpable!

Amongst the beautiful homes near the bay is a huge section of rows and rows of connected metal shacks. It is very sad and unbelievable how these poor people live, although, interestingly enough, they each have a satellite dish.

Our scenic drive to two beautiful and prestigious wineries near Cape Town, in a town named Franschhoek, was stunning. It is surrounded by lush natural beauty, water, and mountains, and the wine tastings were very special. The town of Franschhoek is very quaint, charming, and upscale with 45 wineries in and surrounding it! I loved the Huguenot Fine Chocolate Shop and other charming shops and art galleries filled with lots of beautiful artistic gifts. There also was a colorful open-air market. The town was very busy and had a lovely vibe!

My first helicopter ride ever over Cape Town gave us a bird's eye view over the city and followed the outstanding coast to see Table Mountain, The Twelve Apostles, Chapman's Peak, and the bays and towns that line the shores of the Cape Peninsula.

The weather and clouds and lots of wind can change very quickly in Cape Town, so we took advantage of getting our ride in even though it wasn't the sunniest day, but so incredibly beautiful nonetheless! The terrain is outstanding and the bright aqua water outlining the shore made for beautiful and colorful photos. I loved it! Cape Town has a population of about 4.8 million and is where the very first

heart transplant in the world took place in 1967. We passed the Groote Schuur Hospital where it was performed.

Dan and I took a cable car ride up to Table Mountain, the iconic flat-top summit overlooking Cape Town with breathtaking views and even clouds you feel you can almost touch! The flat top is perfect for walking to get 360-degree views of the peninsula and coastlines. The cable cars have a state-of-the-art rotating floor to ensure that all visitors get a well-rounded view for the 5-minute ride up the mountain! A restaurant and refreshments are at the top.

Our drive to see the African Penguins was not planned but our tour guide added it for us since we couldn't fly into our one lodge in Botswana in the bush because of foggy weather, so I'm so happy we added this beautiful experience! These endangered birds can be observed at close range on the beach in a residential area, wandering freely in a protected natural environment. This is between Simon's Town and Cape Point, and called Boulders, which has become world famous for its thriving colony of African Penguins and magnificent wind sheltered, safe beaches.

We also passed the Victor Verster prison where Nelson Mandela was incarcerated and eventually released from. We took group photos by the Nelson Mandela statue

It was very colorful and interesting to go to the Cape Town waterfront, "Historical Victoria and Alfred Waterfront and Cape Town Link to the Sea," with their Robinson Dry Dock. It is one of a few left in the world for ship repair and one was actually being worked on. One of their three moving bridges there opens and closes sideways for these ships. We saw the first hotel called Victoria and Alfred, the building from 1904, a former cold storage warehouse, and lots of colorful shops and restaurants, boat tours, a huge mall, etc. This is a very thriving, fun, high energy location with many people! The Watershed, a huge indoor market for the best in local art, ceramics, jewelry, clothing, and more, was very fun to walk through and find gifts. We also visited their Two Oceans Aquarium, so there was a lot to see, do, and absorb in one, sprawling spot! With the backdrop of Tabletop Mountain and the water, it was very picturesque!

I brought five African Rand bills home for my scrapbook as each one has one of the "Big Five" animals on it.

Our long (almost 16-hour flight) back to the USA from Cape Town to Atlanta (en route to our final St. Louis destination) was the longest one either of us had experienced, but we survived!

This African trip was truly a journey of incredible sights, sounds, and experiences. Filled with adventures, unpredictability, rough tracks, dust, and so much beauty, it was all part of a magnificent experience that is hard to express! But it filled me with great emotion and was very moving. In Africa, it's all about timing, patience, and flexibility. It truly was a trip of a lifetime and the authenticity, rawness of nature, beauty, and wonder very much opened my eyes to this other fascinating world - one that I will never forget!

### Legendary Sokol Marie Provazníková's Memoir

To byl Sokol (That was Sokol) is a historical memoir by the legendary Sokol Marie Provazníková, who documented the role the Sokol movement played in gymnastics, culture, and the democratic values of the Czech people from the first decade of the nineteenth century to 1948.

Provazníková's book was first published in 1988, but only in Czech. Emilie Martinet, Albert Pokorny and Grace Cahlander, members of Sokol Baltimore, translated this important work in 1991, but it was not published. A copy of the type-written translation of the book was given to the Sokol Museum and Library by Provazníková's granddaughters, and was edited.

The current book includes 1) the English version of her book with editorial comments, 2) the history of her life in Bohemia, and 3) her life in America after her defection from the 1948 Olympics in London.

The significance of To byl Sokol is that it is a detailed account of the struggles of the Czech people during their lives under the Austrian and Austrian-Hungarian Empires, World War I, and then under oppression by the Nazis during World War II, and the Communist coup in 1948. Provazníková, an official in the Czech Sokol organization and the International Gymnastics Federation, was personally involved in all of the historic events detailed in her book. The new information included in this publication completes her story and its significance.

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

I gave a two-hour Watercolor Techniques class to Des Plaines Art Guild members on November 2. Our lodge held its annual Memorial Service. (See photo.)


