Board Report

August 1, 2024

The August meeting of the CSA Board of Directors was held in Nashville, Tennessee prior to the Get-Together. All members were present.

The Board would like to thank John Kielczewski, Nick Kosmas, Kelly Deegan, Anna Trush, Julie Souza, and Molly May for all their efforts in organizing a wonderful time for all who attended. Congratulations to Delaney Schretter, our new Miss CSA. Thanks to Karly Ledvina and Cassidy Payer for participating. We hope you consider competing again next year in Cleveland.

Trevor Rupe and Bryce Bevill from Parkway Advisors attended the Get-Together and were able to meet with the Board in person. The second quarter of 2024 carried familiar trends: inflation surprises, rising yields, volatility, and focus on the Federal Reserve. They remain focused on strong credit quality, improving net investment income, and structuring cash flows that are sufficient to meet the needs of the Society.

Sales Manager Julie Souza reported that

we are on track to exceed our goal for Whole Life sales with an average age of 40 for the new members.

Kelly Deegan, Fraternal Programs Manager, reported that the lodges have been posting on Facebook and submitting articles and pictures to *the Journal*. There have been steady donations to the Scholarship Fund, both from individuals and lodges. Remember that these donations from the lodges count toward the Lodge Recognition Program.

Secretary-Treasurer Nick Kosmas explained the various considerations for updating the computer system. He also informed us on Marketsphere, which is the reporting company that searches for the Limited Social Security Death Master File for unknown deaths to CSA so that we can update our records and pay the beneficiaries.

President John Kielczewski reported that the State of Illinois has completed the audit they perform every five years.

So Honored to be Crowned Miss National CSA


Greetings brothers and sisters,

A member shall forfeit any prize money won if it shall be determined subsequent to the conclusion of the Tournament that the premiums were not paid in accordance with the foregoing provision. Team and doubles partner are also affected.

Any combination of members of several or various lodges, whether or not bowling in regularly constituted CSA leagues, are eligible to bowl in the Team Event, provided that teams so entered not in regularly constituted CSA League or Leagues, shall have a team average not exceeding 920

In the Doubles Event any combinations of members are eligible whether or not they are members of the same lodge. There will be no limit as to their combined average. There will be no limits in the Singles Event or for All Events.

HANDICAP: All CSA Bowling Tournaments shall be conducted only on the handicap basis in all events with handicaps to be designated as follows:

TEAM EVENT: 90% of the difference between the sum of the averages of the individual bowlers of each team and 920.

DOUBLES EVENT: 90% of the difference between the sum of the averages of the individual bowlers of each team and 460.

SINGLES EVENT: 90% of the difference between the individual bowler's average and 230

All handicaps are to be computed on a per game basis.

OFFICIAL AVERAGES:

- 1. Averages to be used shall be the individual's highest average for the last season (2022-2023), provided at least twenty-one (21) games have been bowled.
- 2. If the bowler has no established average for last season, use the highest average compiled for the previous season (2021-2022), provided that not less than twenty-one (21) games were bowled.
 - 3. If a bowler has bowled in the last three (3) Ohio/Penn CSA Tournaments with no established league average, the cumulative average of those tournaments will be used.
 - If a bowler meets none of the criteria stipulated above, men will use an average of 160, and women will use an average of 130.

LANES: The Tournament Committee shall assign all lanes, with care taken to avoid duplication of lanes bowled upon for any individual or team.

TARDY PLAYERS: Tardy players shall start in the frame being bowled when they are ready to commence bowling, with zeroes being given for each frame missed. ENTRY FEE:

TEAM EVENT: \$26.00 plus bowling and tournament expense fees. DOUBLES EVENT: \$13.00 plus bowling and tournament expense fees. SINGLES EVENT: \$6.50 plus bowling and tournament expense fees.

\$2.00 per person only

BOWLING AND EXPENSE FEES: The Tournament Committee shall designate the bowling fee and the Tournament expense fee for each three-game series to be paid by each. bowler, which fees are to accompany the entry fees stated above when submitting entry blank. The amount of bowling and Tournament expense fees shall be clearly stated on the front side of the entry blank for each event in the same manner as the entry fees are shown above. NO REFUNDS.

MORAL SUPPORT SANCTION: All CSA bowling tournaments shall be sponsored under Moral Support Sanction of the USBC for high score protection. USBC and non-USBC members may participate in a Moral Support sanctioned tournament with high score recognition automatically extended to USBC members. Eligible non-league or non-sanction bowlers can qualify for high score recognition at their option by payment for a card for which USBC will issue an unattached membership card.

ENTRY BLANKS: A check to cover the entire entry fees of all bowlers listed on any one entry blank is to accompany each entry. NO REFUNDS.

PRIZE LIST: The Tournament Committee shall, when entries have been closed, prepare a prize list of cash prizes and trophies to be awarded, which shall be mailed to each participating team captain with the schedule of bowling. Care shall be taken that not less than one (1) prize in each event to be paid for each three (3) participating bowlers.

PREVIOUS TOURNAMENT PRIZE WINNERS: A bowler desiring participation in the Tournament, who has qualified for a prize of \$300.00 or more in any tournament within the twelve (12) month period immediately preceding this tournament, must report their actual score, position and amount won when submitting entry for this tournament for possible re-rating. Such re-rating, if applied, shall be made before the entrant bowls, and, if not accepted, their entry fee shall be refunded. Failure to comply with this provision shall be cause to forfeit tournament entry fees and prize winnings. In any such re-rating, applicable USBC rules or regulations shall apply.

WRITTEN CONSENT OF PARENT OR GUARDIAN: All grade school and high school students, who have not attained the age of eighteen (18) years, must have the written consent of their parent or guardian in order to participate in any cash prize available in this tournament.

Sunday morning, we enjoyed a very interesting presentation on human and animal migration by Jessica Decker.



across the country have much to be thankful for that Helen served us so faithfully.




